Please read the following book over the summer: **To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee**

This year's summer reading assignments are a little different from what you're used to, so please follow the instructions and do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions.

Follow these guidelines:

- You must choose activities that ADD UP to **150 points for CP** and **175 points for Honors.**
- For a **30-point activity**, you must write at least **TWO paragraphs**.
- Remember, each paragraph must include a **minimum of 8-10 sentences.** Make sure you have a topic sentence, supporting details, and a concluding sentence.
- You MUST select activities from the different elements of fiction (characters, setting, personal connections, and story structure).
- You can do additional activities/tasks to obtain more points.
- You will need to submit your summer reading assignments on the first day of school via Google Classroom.
- ALL work must be TYPED.
- Make sure you make it clear which activities you are choosing by adding the letter and title of each activity.

Summer Reading Grades:

When you return in September, I will collect the work you have completed for *To Kill a Mockingbird* on the first or second day of class.

DO NOT take the answers from online; you will receive a ZERO if you are suspected of plagiarizing or using an AI tool.

You will be tested on the novel within the first marking. I realize that the summer reading texts can be easily obtained online and that you could complete the work without reading the book. But you have been given assignments and essay prompts that will be impossible to complete unless you have read the novel. Please do not attempt to complete assignments or write an essay on a book you haven't read- it will not go well.

FAILURE TO COMPLETE THE SUMMER READING WILL AFFECT THE 1st MARKING PERIOD GRADE, AS THIS IS ASSIGNMENT WILL BE GRADED AS A TEST AND QUIZ GRADE.
